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A Star Falls from the Sky (1934)

A Star Falls from Heaven is an Austrian singing and romantic film directed by Max Neufeld and starring Joseph Schmidt.

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Plot

Josef Reiner is a Viennese music student, extremely talented as a tenor, but not particularly fit for life. The young Annerl Bachinger, a piano teacher, secretly adores Josef because of his clear, dreamlike voice. Reiner has just missed out on a singing role in a movie production with the popular singing tenor Lincoln because Reiner fails to produce his magnificent operatic voice every time he sees someone bite into a lemon. This is the chance for Annerl to prove her love to "her" Josef. She goes to the film production company to warmly recommend Josef to the director. By chance she ends up in a film set where Lincoln is. She thinks she sees the boss of this film company in this room designed as an office. Lincoln takes a liking to the dashing girl and invites her to a wine tavern evening where Josef Reiner is supposed to be performing. As luck would have it, Lincoln's manager Tomson is also present at this time, but he is not allowed to know that the film's favorite is also here.

When Tomson hears Reiner's voice, which is very similar to Lincoln's, he is furious as he believes that film favorite Lincoln is giving himself up for a simple pleasure in a wine tavern. The star and manager promptly clashed the following day, and as a result of the argument, Lincoln grabbed a bottle that he thought was whiskey. But it contains a corrosive liquid that temporarily makes it impossible for the artist to sing. This is Josef Reiner's hour. Although he initially refuses to lend his own voice to Lincoln in the remaining

film recordings, he is eventually persuaded to do so. While Lincoln opens and closes his mouth, Josef sings to him behind the curtain. The whole affair threatens to be exposed soon, as Josef now finds that Lincoln is beginning to be more interested in the pretty Annerl than Josef would like. Now Tomson and Josef clash, and the press present notices all of this. In order to save the dangerous situation, Lincoln claims that everything was staged that way because he wanted to introduce the new singing talent Josef Reiner to the general public in this way. Ultimately, Josef not only gets the chance for a great singing career, but also the heart of his girlfriend.

Production notes

A Star Falls from Heaven was created in Vienna-Sievering in October 1934 and premiered in the Austrian capital on December 28, 1934. There was no German premiere until 1945 due to the Jewish lead actor Schmidt.

Hans May used foreign compositions in his music and also took over the musical direction. Anton Schmid designed the film structures, Alfred Norkus was responsible for the sound. Karl Ehrlich was the production manager. Ernst Neubach wrote the lyrics .

The later famous theater manager and director Ernst Heinz Häussermann made his film debut here at the age of 18 alongside his father Reinhold Häussermann .

Things to know

A British version of the film was also made in 1936 as *A Star Fell From Heaven*, directed by Paul Merzbach . Joseph Schmidt also took on the leading role here.

Reviews

Paimann's film lists summed up: "Xth variation of the 'Singer's Fate', with nice ideas but not staged at a particularly brisk pace. Schmidt is used according to his abilities... A good middle film." [1]

The *Österreichische Film-Zeitung* wrote: "The singer's voice is reproduced softly and melodiously through the microphone." [2]

On film.at it says: "What's nice, and absolutely appropriate for the best of all films about Joseph Schmidt: Neufeld was able to do something with the stocky, visually not particularly striking, but warmly charismatic tenor and cantor like no other. This is particularly evident in the range of the film and its register of moods and emotions." [3]
